And yet these five educated men who follow ~~that precept~~ the teachings of Jesus Christ the Son of God the Almighty did not follow that precept. They went defenceless to meet hoards of ignorant savages. Before God the flesh, blood, and bone of man may be equal, but to drop men of high education and sensitiveness to the level of a savage in a wild Jungle without defence!
